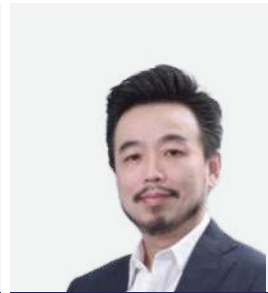

Food & Nature Program drives transformative change in the crucial areas of food, nature, and water through its leadership standards, advocacy, and cross-value chain projects. From production to consumption, the program leverages its resources to create meaningful impact at the intersection of critical environmental issues such as climate change and food systems. With a focus on delivering results at scale, the Food & Nature Program is poised to make a significant contribution towards a more sustainable future.

Food & Nature Program

GRASP2030

GRASP2030 initiative is a call to action for businesses and stakeholders across the Indonesian food system to join forces in making food production and consumption more sustainable. This voluntary agreement is aimed at halving food loss and waste by 2030 in line with SDG Goal 12.3, bringing environmental, social, and economic benefits for participating organizations and the country. Additionally, reducing food waste through redistribution can help alleviate hunger, in line with SDG Goal 2. Launched by IBCSD on September 8th, 2021, the GRASP2030 is a powerful manifestation of the private sector's commitment to creating a more sustainable food chain in Indonesia. The GRASP2030 has 23 signatories, including 9 core signatories from businesses and 14 associate signatories who support the initiative. The GRASP2030 initiative aims to halve food loss and waste by 2030 and increase environmental, social, and economic benefits.

Activities

01

GRASP Steering Group Meeting

17-Feb; 24-May; 17-Nov 2022

The GRASP 2030 is a long term program which requires commitments from its actors. The Steering Group is formed in order to ensure strong governance and continuity of the program by reviewing and advising on the overarching GRASP 2030. The Steering Group meeting is designed to be held 3 times in a year to discuss past activities' reflection, next steps, challenges and opportunities of the program as well as the champions to be seated in the Steering Group members

02

Food Waste Action Week

7-13 March 2022

The second annual Food Waste Action Week is an event that aims to raise awareness and prevent household food waste. IBCSD took part in this campaign organized by the Love Food Hate Waste. The event focuses on educating the public about proper food storage techniques and reducing food waste. IBCSD supported Food Waste Action Week by sharing assets and content about "Food Storage Mistakes" on IBCSD social media. One of the main barriers to reducing food waste in Indonesia is changing public behavior and mindset. The event highlights the importance of freezing and defrosting food correctly and how it can prevent waste and save money for families.

03

WRAP UK visit Indonesia to Reinforce Support for GRASP2030 on Halving Food Loss and Waste

24-27 May 2022

The International Director of WRAP UK, Richard Swannell, and his International Program Manager, Michael Jones, visited Jakarta from 24th to 27th May 2022 to further the efforts of GRASP2030. The two WRAP UK representatives met with government officials, the Danish Embassy, Sintesa Groups, and the GRASP2030 Steering Committee to discuss ways of reducing food waste and loss, developing sustainable products, and efficiently using resources. WRAP UK is the strategic partner in delivering GRASP2030 and has extensive experience in reducing food waste and loss globally, working in 43 countries.

04

Food Loss & Waste (FLW) Measurement & Reporting Working Group

11 January & 22 April 2022

What gets measured, gets managed. Measuring and reporting food loss and waste helps companies understand the root causes of FLW and can develop robust evidence-based plans to reduce it for the long term. Held on 11 January 2022, the first session of GRASP 2030 Measurement and Reporting Working Group was aimed to endorse the signatories to collaborate and best utilize resources and tools provided in GRASP 2030. The session provided a discussion room for the Signatories on FLW measurement and reporting method to make a clear progress against individual and collective targets. Sam Gillick-Daniels, the Lead Analyst of WRAP explained the methodology to measure FLW for sectors like manufacturing, retail, hospitality, and food service. He also introduced the FLW reporting template which can be used by signatories to report their own FLW and reduction results. The second session on 22 April 2022 refreshed the signatories with the method and template introduced in the first session. Here, the signatories reflected on their progress on FLW measurement and how GRASP2030 can move forward to establish a robust national FLW data. The discussion also emphasized on how measurement and reporting can deliver collective impacts towards FLW reduction goals.

05

Food Donation Working Group

24 February & 28 July 2022

GRASP2030 held a Food Donation Working Group discussion on July 28, 2022. The aim of the event was to encourage collaboration between companies with food surplus and supporting organizations in order to reduce food loss and waste in Indonesia and help those in need. The discussion was attended by representatives from various companies and organizations and featured remarks by Cogito Ergo Sumadi, the Chairman of GRASP2030 and General Manager of FoodCycle Indonesia, who emphasized the importance of donating excess food instead of throwing it away. The discussion also included insights from Michael Jones, International Program Manager of WRAP UK, who shared the success story of the Courtauld Commitment 2030 in the UK and the challenges companies face in implementing food donation programs.

06

GRASP2030 1st Anniversary

8 September 2022

The GRASP2030 Anniversary seminar was held to celebrate the first year of the organization's efforts in reducing food waste. The event was attended by prominent figures from the business and government sectors, as well as members of GRASP2030 and its collaborating organizations. The seminar emphasized the importance of reducing food waste and its impact on the environment and economy. GRASP2030 continues to work towards reducing food waste by increasing the capacity of the private sector, measuring and reporting progress, launching a website and social media campaign, and collaborating with the government.

07

Regional Technical Workshop on Food Loss and Waste (FLW)

5-6 October 2022

The Technical Workshop on Food Loss and Waste was organized by the Agricultural Research and Development Agency (Balitbangtan) of the Ministry of Agriculture in Indonesia. The event was held over two days and aimed to discuss the latest innovations in reducing food loss and waste in the ASEAN region, identify relevant measurement methods, and determine appropriate policies to be implemented regionally. IBCSD was invited to present GRASP2030 as an example of Indonesian FLW initiatives initiated by the private sector. The workshop was attended by representatives from 9 ASEAN countries, including policy makers, universities, companies, and associations.



08

Meetings with GRASP2030 Stakeholders

15-18 November 2022

IBCSD and its main partner for GRASP2030, WRAP, held a series of meetings in Jakarta on November 15th to 18th, 2022. The meetings were aimed at convening with stakeholders to continue discussions on the progress of GRASP2030. The meetings included visits to the Ministry of National Development Planning and the Netherlands and Danish Embassies, as well as the 3rd GRASP2030 Steering Group Meeting. The goal of the meetings was to evaluate the progress of GRASP2030 and discuss the next steps for reducing food loss and waste (FLW) in Indonesia. The meetings resulted in the agreement to support the #Consumindful campaign, which was a part of GRASP2030's efforts to raise public awareness on FLW, and the importance of data, policy, and stakeholder commitment to address the issue.

JCAF

(Jurisdiction Collective Actions Forum)

IBCSD has joined forces with ten other sustainability-focused organizations under the auspices of the Tropical Forest Alliance (TFA) to form the Jurisdiction Collective Actions Forum (JCAF). This collaboration, established in July 2021, is dedicated to promoting sustainability through multi-stakeholder partnerships across industries and sectors. JCAF strives to balance the often-competing social, economic, and environmental objectives at a jurisdictional level and create positive outcomes for all stakeholders involved

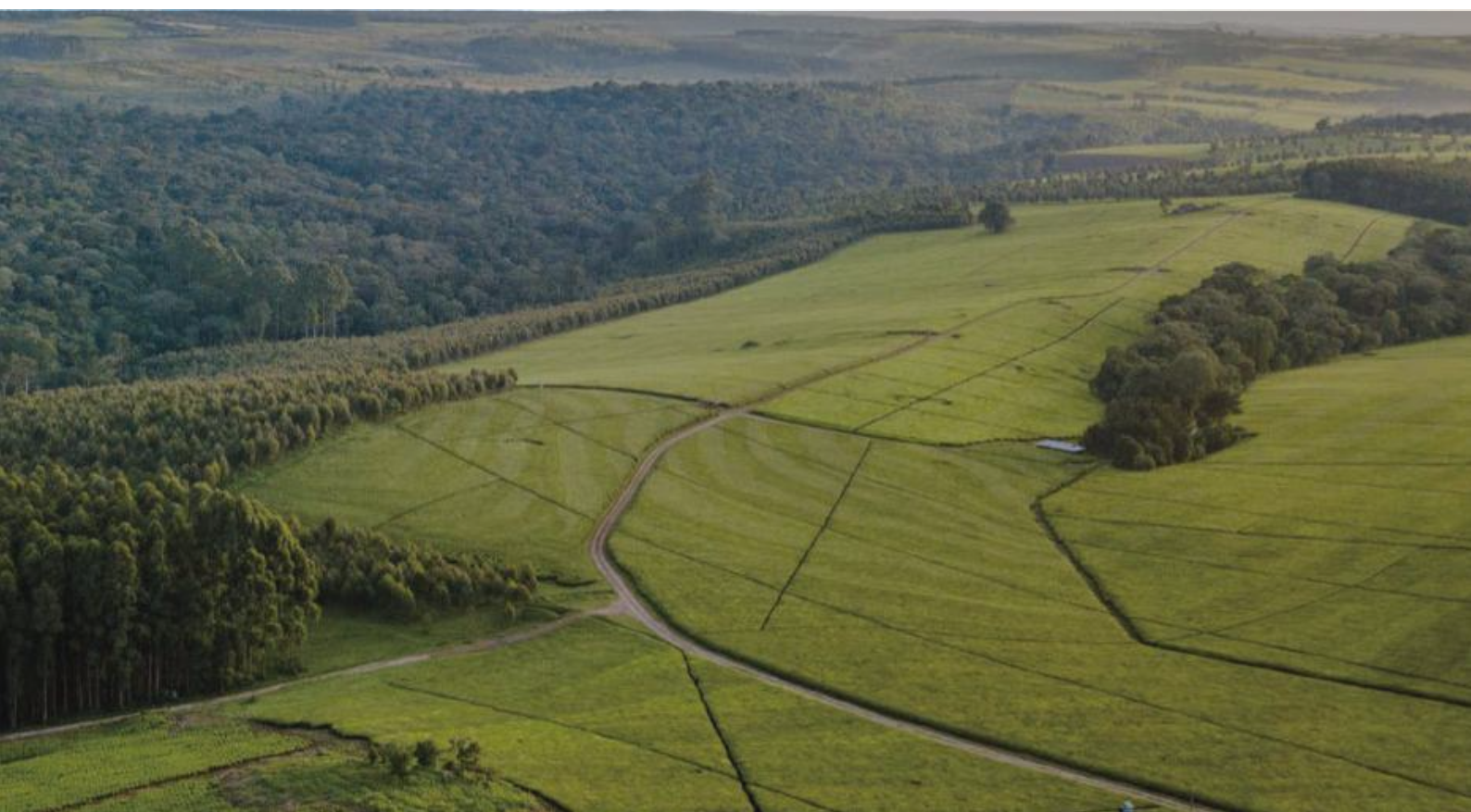

JCAF Knowledge Sharing Event

13 - 31 August 2022

IBCSD participated as a speaker to share about Tackling Food Loss & Waste at Sub-national Level: Enabling Sustainable and Climate-Resilient Food System. A total of 12 knowledge sharing events have been conducted, covering a variety of topics relevant to promote jurisdictional sustainability. The objective of this event is to facilitate multi-stakeholder dialogues to discuss ideas, opportunities, challenges, best practices and build a network to achieve jurisdictional sustainability.

T20

IBCSD hosted a T20 side event dialogue as part of the G20 agenda. T20 is the official engagement group consisting of a think tank and research center. The 2022 T20 is dedicated to ensuring a steady approach in tackling the world's most pressing issues. IBCSD took part in the Task Force (TF) 4 which focused on Food Security and Sustainable Agriculture issues.

Activities

01 Tackling Food Loss and Waste, Driving Transformation Through Innovation and Collaboration

16 June 2022

IBCSD, together with Center for Transdisciplinary and Sustainability Sciences (CTSS), organized a webinar titled "Tackling Food Loss and Waste: Driving Transformation Through Innovation and Collaboration". The purpose of this webinar is to provide a platform for discussions on how collaboration among various stakeholders and the use of innovation and technology can help solve the issue of food loss and waste and achieve a sustainable and climate-resilient food system. This event brought together stakeholders from government, researcher, and business leaders to contribute to the idea of tackling food loss and waste issues.



Food & Nature Program

Journey to Sustainable Development through Practical Collaboration with Food Bank

15 July 2022

IBCSD, in collaboration with FoodCycle and The Global FoodBanking Network held a seminar on "Journey to Sustainable Development through Practical Collaboration with the Food Bank". The seminar aims to encourage collaboration between stakeholders to reduce food waste and achieve the Zero Hunger and Responsible Consumption and Production goals. The event highlighting the role of food banks during the COVID-19 pandemic has been critical in providing access to food for people in need. It was opened by Co-founder and CEO of FoodCycle Indonesia, Astrid Paramita, Executive Director of IBCSD, Indah Budiani, and Member of the Indonesian House of Representatives Commission VIII and Deputy Chair of the MPR RI, Hidayat Nur Wahid. A key speaker, Director of Field Services of The Global Food Banking Network, Craig A. Nemitz, who mentioned the importance of the presence of food banks as a solution for world's hunger issues.

The program provides valuable insights and practical strategies that enable businesses to align their products, services, processes, and practices with the evolving needs, rights, goals, and aspirations of society. By doing so, the People program helps companies future-proof their businesses and ensure their long-term success in a constantly changing world.

People Program

Green Lifestyle Working Group

IBCSD has established the Green Lifestyle (GL) Program to help encourage the private sector to embrace responsible consumption and production (SDG 12). This program seeks to promote a shift in the mindset and practices of companies towards more environmentally-friendly and sustainable operations and also to build the enabling environment to create consumers' demand for sustainable products. The aim is to support the private sector in making a positive impact on the environment, while also contributing to the wider goal of promoting sustainable development. By participating in the GL Program, companies will have access to the latest information, tools, and resources needed to adopt more sustainable practices and make a tangible difference in the world. This year, Green Lifestyle activities were focused on sustainable sourcing.

Activities

01 Sustainability Talk: Recover Stronger through Low-Carbon Economy 15 March 2022

The virtual dialogue "Recover Stronger Through Low-Carbon Economy" was organized by the IBCSD in collaboration with the WWF Indonesia Foundation. The Ministry of Trade and the Ministry of Industry emphasized the importance of the sustainable development of the palm oil industry, which is a leading labor-intensive sector that supports the national economy. Representatives from the RSPO, WWF, and HSBC Indonesia participated in the panel discussion, which aimed to promote sustainability as a collective duty that requires cross-sectoral collaboration. They discussed the development of regulations for the palm oil industry, the implementation of sustainable palm oil production practices, and financing investment in sustainability, emphasizing the importance of KPIs, good governance, and regular reporting to avoid greenwashing practices.





02 Sustainability Talk: Multi-Party Collaboration From Production To Consumption Towards Sustainable Palm Oil Practices

21 June 2022

The Sustainability Talk webinar, organized by IBCSD and WWF Indonesia, was held on June 21, 2022 in Jakarta to discuss sustainable palm oil practices among stakeholders. The focus of the webinar was to balance the increase in domestic demand for crude palm oil (CPO) with environmental, social, and governance (ESG) considerations for sustainable management, particularly in the production side. Representatives from the business world, associations, and civil society organizations participated in the discussion forum. The webinar highlighted the commitment of stakeholders to support sustainable palm oil practices as part of the country's G20 presidency which prioritizes encouraging sustainable investment across all business activities.

03 CEO Breakfast Forum - Synergy for Sustainable Palm Oil

14 October 2022

The CEO Breakfast Forum - Synergy for Sustainable Palm Oil is a joint initiative of IBCSD, WWF Indonesia, and Accenture aimed at promoting sustainable consumption and production in the palm oil industry in Indonesia. The event targets CEOs and top management representatives from companies operating in the country and aims to increase the understanding of the importance of sustainable procurement practices and to encourage their commitment to using sustainable palm oil products. The event also aims to strengthen the leadership and collaboration of the business sector and invite both upstream and downstream palm oil companies to join in the effort towards sustainable development.

The Paris Agreement has established the need for action to tackle climate change and transform the energy system towards a sustainable future for business, society, and the environment. IBCSD's Climate & Energy Program aims to support this effort by fostering interaction and collaboration on climate and energy topics between members, stakeholders, and peers. The program encourages the sharing of best practices and solutions to address critical industry issues in the transition towards a clean economy.

Climate & Energy Program

Towards Net Zero Emission

Towards Net Zero Emissions (TowardNZE) serves as a hub for knowledge, expertise, and connections for businesses in supporting Indonesia's goal of reaching net zero emissions. The platform facilitates business investment in carbon neutrality and encourages value chain collaboration by connecting businesses to existing projects, initiatives, case studies, and calls to action. To support these companies in the transition process, TowardNZE is developed in partnership with KADIN Net Zero Hub, with technical support from World Resource Institute (WRI) Indonesia and CDP serving as knowledge partners. The goal of the initiative is to help companies plan, execute and report on concrete actions to achieve emission neutrality and to build a Net Zero ecosystem in Indonesia.

Activities

01

Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Protocol Bootcamp

The Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Protocol Bootcamp was hosted by the IBCSD, in partnership with the WRI and CDP as the knowledge partner. The bootcamp has been conducted five times and attended by in total of 27 companies. The goal of the bootcamp was to provide training and support to companies in their transition to a low-carbon economy. The Science Based Targets initiative (SBTi) was introduced as a way for companies to set net-zero targets by 2050 using a standardized framework. The bootcamp aimed to give an overview of SBTi target setting and a deep dive into GHG Protocol to help companies understand and implement the guidelines.

02

Corporate Assistance Program (CAP)

CAP is an intensive program to assist companies to lead their own steps with the goal to commit to SBTi by the end of the program. The companies are expected to be able to conduct GHG inventory/baselining for Scope 1 and 2 emissions and can disclose the calculation of baseline emissions calculation through the CDP climate change questionnaires when the disclosures period has opened. The program provides online classes and training, toolkits, as well as 1-on-1 assistance for companies. Included in the toolkit are guidelines and 1-for-all Learning Management System where the companies can access all resources and modules needed throughout the program.

03

Promoting Net Zero: Business Action towards Net Zero Emission

29 August 2022

IBCSD supported The CEO Networking Forum, with the theme "Business Leadership and Collective Actions towards Net-Zero Emissions". It was held on 29th August 2022 and was attended by approximately 50 company leaders from different sectors. The forum aimed to provide information on the role of KADIN NZH in encouraging the transition to Net Zero, and to promote leadership, networking, and collaboration between business sectors. The forum also presented speakers from KADIN NZH, CDP Indonesia, WRI Indonesia, and IBCSD, and highlighted the importance of using a framework based on the Science Based Target Initiative, calculating greenhouse gas emissions inventory, and reporting on climate change.

04

Indonesia Net Zero Summit 2022 – Industrial Decarbonization at All Cost

11 November 2022

The Indonesia Net Zero Summit 2022 took place on November 11, 2022, in Bali, and was supported by the IBCSD. The event brought together over 1,000 participants from different countries to discuss large-scale industrial decarbonization and was the first national discussion on this topic. The summit involved the private sector, government, and financial institutions, with the aim of deepening understanding of the opportunities and challenges of industrial decarbonization in Indonesia. The summit consisted of panel discussions covering various issues, including decarbonizing the value chain, decarbonizing hard-to-abate industries, decarbonizing the power grid, corporate climate governance, and engagement through the financial sector. The main objective was to raise awareness and encourage collaboration among different parties to address the challenges of industrial decarbonization and tackle climate issues in Indonesia.

The organization works towards this goal by creating partnerships, educational resources, and providing guidance and case studies to enable companies to integrate ESG performance into their business and financial practices. The ultimate objective of Redefining Value is to enhance decision-making and external disclosure, leading to a transformation in the financial system that rewards the most sustainable companies.

Redefining Value Program

SDGs Working Group

IBCSD organizes periodic forums in the SDGs Working Group to exchange knowledge, experiences and ideas that can accelerate the achievement of SDGs in Indonesia.

Activities

01 National Dialogue: Strengthening Regional Development through Multi-Stakeholder Engagement in SDGs Implementation

30 May 2022

IBCSD held a national level panel discussion with the theme "No One Left Behind: Strengthening Regional Development through Multi-Stakeholder Engagement in SDGs Implementation". The objective of the event was to promote sharing of knowledge and strengthen collaboration among government, private sector, and non-governmental organizations in SDGs planning and implementation. There were 201 participants including policy makers/government, business sector, academia/SDGs practitioners, media, civil society organizations, youth/millennial groups, and speakers from the National Secretariat of SDGs Indonesia, Mimika District Government, PT Freeport Indonesia, PT Vale, UNDP Indonesia, SDGs Center UNPAD, and Lingkar Temu Kabupaten Lestari.



Redefining Value Program

Webinar dan Policy Brief Launching: Corporate Contribution to Achieve Sustainable Development Goals

24 November 2022

On November 24, 2022, the Webinar and Policy Brief Launching event was held in JS Luwansa Hotel and Convention Center with the theme of "Corporate Contribution to Achieve Sustainable Development Goals". The event aimed to disseminate the work of CDP and IBCSD on the policy brief about private sector achievements towards SDG 13 (Climate Action) and SDG 15 (Life on Land) based on the CDP's 2021 Climate Change and Forestry Questionnaire. The event provided an opportunity to raise awareness about the important role of the private sector in supporting the 2030 SDGs agenda and offered insights into the challenges and opportunities faced by the private sector in achieving SDGs. A diverse group of speakers, including government officials, academics, and business leaders, shared their perspectives on efforts to achieve the SDGs in Indonesia. The policy brief was seen as a tool for companies to increase their capacity in SDG 13 and 15 and to better manage risks related to climate change.

Circular Economy program aims at promoting circular economy practices among the business sector. The linear model of business is unsustainable and has limitations, and the concept of circularity is seen as a solution to these issues. The program aims to create a safe platform for businesses to co-develop circular solutions and drive their transition towards a more sustainable model. The program also provides companies with new standards, tools, advocacy, insights, and experiences that enable them to unlock their full potential in adopting circular practices.

Circular Economy Program

Tackling Marine Litter

IBCSD, with the support of the SEA circular project funded by the Swedish Government and implemented by UNEP and COBSEA, conducted a project that engaged various stakeholders in the plastic value chain to stop land-based leakage that lead to marine plastic pollution. This project aimed to create a forum that will support the journey for the successful implementation of EPR and the growth and scale-up of the Producer responsibility organizations (PRO)

Activities

01 Engagement with regional partner on EPR

16 March 2022

IBCSD engaged with Alliance to End Plastic Waste in the SEA region to provide input to their policy brief and to gather input for future activities. IBCSD also participated in a joint OECD-ILO-UNEP webinar on responsible business conduct for addressing plastic waste, presenting the project and their engagement with the private sector.

02 Industrial Talk

11 April 2022

IBCSD conducted a dialogue with plastic & packaging manufacturers in collaboration with IPR and GIZ on April 11th, 2022, which was attended by 188 participants representing government institutions, FMCG companies, technology centers, finance organizations, and industries like energy, automotive, cement, furniture, and more. Key takeaways from the dialogue included the need for collaboration and incentives, infrastructure, derivative regulations, and the biggest challenge being the collection of plastic waste. The participants also discussed the need for additional motivation for business owners to switch to economically viable packaging and the challenge of distinguishing the types of plastic waste.

03 Roundtable & Training: Adopting Human Rights Based Approach into the Plastic Value Chain

7 June 2022

IBCSD supported the SEA Circular (a project of the UN Environment Program and the Coordinating Agency for East Asian Seas) to hold a discussion and training on "Adopting a Human Rights-Based Approach to the Plastics Value Chain." The project, funded by the Swedish government, aims to reduce marine plastic waste and encourage market-based solutions. The training was attended by 70 participants from various business sectors and included key figures such as Sinta Saptarina, Director of Waste Reduction for the Ministry of Environment and Forestry, and Dr. Sara L. Seck, Associate Professor and Associate Dean at Dalhousie University Canada's Schulich School of Law and the Marine & Environmental Law Institute. The training consisted of three modules: (i) Human Rights Dimensions of the Plastic Crisis; (ii) Plastics, Human Rights, and the Environment; and (iii) Business, Human Rights, and Plastics. UNEP hopes that in the future, more businesses will collaborate with stakeholders to support the empowerment of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) and promote higher levels of plastic waste collection and recycling.

04

Dialogue on Enhancing EPR among Consumer Goods and Brand Owners

12 July 2022

IBCSD and the National Plastics Action Partnership (NPAP) held an Industry and Brand Owners Dialogue in Jakarta aimed at reducing plastic waste in Indonesia by encouraging the implementation of extended producer responsibility (EPR). The event was attended by representatives from the Ministry of Environment and Forestry, the Ministry of Industry, and major consumer goods companies, including Nestle, PZ Cussons, and Unilever. The dialogue focused on the challenges of implementing a circular economy and EPR, with a particular emphasis on the role of brand owners and suppliers in reducing plastic waste. The discussion was part of a larger initiative supported by SEA Circular, UNEP, and COBSEA aimed at encouraging businesses to contribute to reducing marine litter through circular economy and EPR practices.

05

Handling Marine Debris through Circularity

30 August 2022

IBCSD hosted a third government and business-industry dialogue aimed at addressing the problem of marine debris in Indonesia through a circular economy. The event was supported by SEA Circular and held in collaboration with the National Coordinating Team for Handling Marine Debris. The goal of the event was to find proposals and solutions for managing plastic waste, including best practices and policy feedback from stakeholders. The discussion was attended by government officials, business leaders, academics, researchers, and industry experts, who emphasized the need for extended stakeholder responsibility in solving the plastic waste problem. The event aimed to serve as a trigger for all stakeholders to work towards a more environmentally conscious economy in Indonesia.

06

Behavioural Change toward Plastic Circularity

4 October 2022

IBCSD promotes the efforts to raise awareness among consumers and the general public about the importance of adopting behaviors that support waste management and the reduction of plastic waste in Indonesia through facilitating a discussion. This event brought together 37 participants. Through the promotion of circularity opportunities, IBCSD aims to improve collaboration and have positive impacts on the economy, environment, and society. One of the key challenges in circular plastics is collection and sorting waste at its source, and this requires changes in behavior at both the business and individual levels. According to the Ministry of Environment and Forestry, households still account for a significant portion (40.8%) of all waste, highlighting the importance of these efforts.

07

Workshop on Plastic Waste Sustainability Reporting Using GRI Standard

6 October 2022

IBCSD facilitated two knowledge-sharing events aimed at addressing plastic waste as a major contributor to global pollution. The first event was the workshop on the Socialization of the SR Guide in plastic and packaging, which had 11 participants, with 85% from the private sector, on October 6th. The second event was the workshop on Circular Transition Indicators (CTI). Recognizing plastic waste as a triple planetary emergency along with biodiversity loss and climate change, IBCSD plans to host a workshop on sustainability reporting using the GRI standard in the plastic value chain to encourage

08

Workshop on Circular Transition Indicators (CTI): A Framework to Accelerate Business Adoption to A Circular Economy

31 October 2022

The World Business Council for Sustainable Development (WBCSD) and thirty collaborating companies have developed the Circular Transition Indicators (CTI) to assist in evaluating a company's circularity performance. CTI v3.0, the most recent version with updates and improvements, was the focus of a workshop hosted by IBCSD on October 31st with over thirty attendees. The workshop, aimed at promoting the tool's adoption by Indonesian businesses, was delivered in collaboration with the Centre for Sustainability and Waste Management at the University of Indonesia.

09

Multi-stakeholder Validation Workshop

15 November 2022

On November 15, 2022, IBCSD held a validation workshop with 10 participants to gather feedback from stakeholders. In addition to the workshop, IBCSD also sought input from the National Coordination Team for Marine Litter Handling (TKN-PSL) and as a result, it was recommended to increase business participation in submitting their Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) roadmap to the Ministry of Environment & Forestry.

10

Implementation of a Roadmap for Reducing Waste by Producers and a Coaching Clinic to Prepare Documents for Planning Waste Reduction in the Context of Reducing Marine Litter

19 December 2022

IBCSD, in collaboration with the Tim Koordinasi Nasional Penanganan Sampah Laut (TKN-PSL) and the Ministry of Environment and Forestry, held a sharing session on December 19, 2022 at the Pullman Hotel Jakarta to address the problem of marine waste and the implementation of the Minister of Environment and Forestry Regulation (Permen LHK) No. 75 of 2019, which aims to reduce waste by producers and retailers. The event brought together government officials, private sector representatives, and recycling associations with the goal of reducing marine waste and encouraging collaboration between various parties. The event also aimed to facilitate producers and retailers to create a Waste Reduction Planning Document that will be submitted to the Ministry of Environment and Forestry portal for reporting and monitoring.

Plenary Meeting and Public Discussion Climate Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation Working Team C40

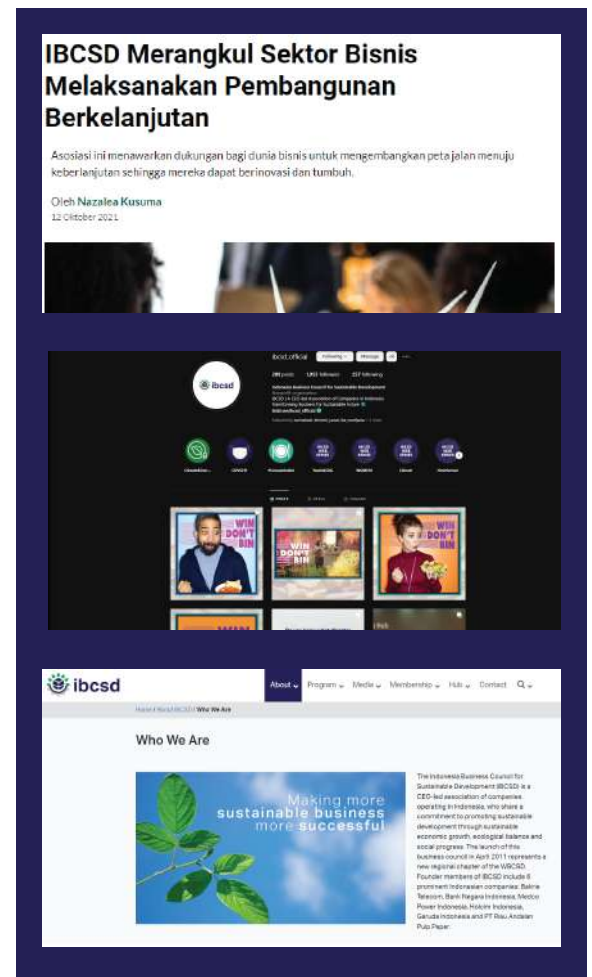
22 September 2022

IBCSD participated in Second Plenary Meeting and Public Discussion Climate Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation Working Team "Mainstreaming Public Communication And Collaboration In Jakarta Towards Net Zero Emission In 2050". Jakarta is taking active steps to combat climate change by reducing its greenhouse gas emissions, becoming a more climate-resilient city, and working towards the goals set by the Paris Agreement. The objectives of this effort include promoting understanding and collaboration in the implementation of climate change communication and the circular economy principle to accelerate action and increase resilience to changing environmental conditions.

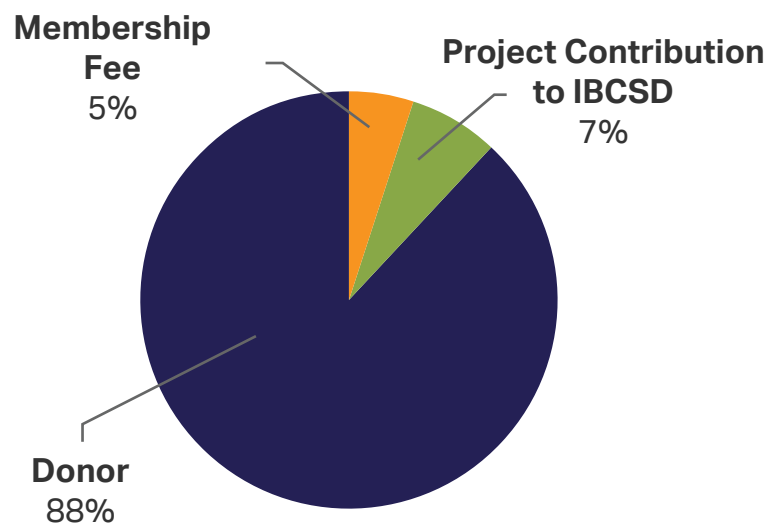
